January 24 RCPNA General Meeting

Featuring Air Quality, Neighborhood Tree Inventory, and Residential Infill Project Updates

Rose City Park Neighborhood Association's (RCPNA's) next interactive general meeting will be held on Tuesday, January 24, 2017, 7 – 9 pm. The meeting is open to the public and will be held at the German American Society, 5626 NE Alameda St., which is ADA-and transit-accessible (TriMet bus lines 12 and 71). Doors open at 6:30 pm.

We are pleased to have several wonderful speakers who will cover a wide array of local topics. From NE Neighborhoods Public Safety Action Committee, RCPNA Board Member Gary Points will provide an update on the Committee's actions towards keeping Rose City Park one of the safest neighborhoods in the area.

For those who are interested in local environmental issues, a representative from DEQ will provide an air quality update, as well as discuss the proven dangers in our air. Likewise, RCPNA Board Member David Gates and a representative from Portland Parks and Recreation will discuss the outcomes of the City of Portland and Neighborhood Street Tree Inventory. In more tree news, a speaker from Friends of Trees will provide an overview of FoT's services, how to volunteer, as well as how to order yard and street trees for the annual Rose City Park tree planting in March.

To wrap up the meeting, an agent from the City of Portland Planning and Sustainability will provide an update on residential infill projects.

It is the time of year to take stock in the bounty we experienced over the holidays, share New Years resolutions so they don't get lost along the way, and contemplate the experiences that 2017 could hold for us and our loved ones. For me, one of the first things I do is clear out the old to make way for the new. In Britain they celebrate 'Boxing Day' the day after Christmas. I love this concept and try it on every January by going through my old clothes, tools, and canned goods supplies to see what I can do without. It's kind of like turning the ground over in the garden to make way for new growth.

That said, let's all join in celebrating a RCPNA Boxing Day at our January 24th General Membership Meeting. I began this annual tradition last year and received 8 bags of clothing donations! Together we will also be facing local changes with our new Mayor Ted Wheeler and City Commissioner Chloe Eudaly. The city will be busy with creating new Zoning Code language for the Residential Infill Project with an Overlay that may allow up to 3 residential units on properties that had only allowed a house and an accessory unit. It will be up to volunteers like yourself to help your neighborhood association make sure the development standard changes for new structure maintain the historic mass and scale of the neighborhood fabric we have come to call home. The city will begin a transportation study on NE Sandy, from Hollywood to NE 82nd, to determine the best route for a new bikeway and pedestrian amenities for which we will need your input.

Hopefully, by the time you read this message, our community has established clear options for addressing those who are house-less in our neighborhoods. Our neighborhood has been working with the housing agencies, Portland Parks and Recreation, and Portland Police Bureau in an effort to maintain civility and safety for all involved. My personal goal for 2017 is to get all the house-less children into a home. Please join me in a moment of gratitude for our lives together, our ability to work through our differences through civil discourse, and our willingness to envision a resilient sustainable future.

Committee reports

Land Use/Transportation

My head is still spinning after dealing with the number of items former Mayor Charlie Hales was trying to address prior to the end of his term in December, as well as new developments and the zoning changes as part of the 2035 Comprehensive Plan. A big shout out to both our Land Use and Transportation Committee members and those on our Board for helping take the lead to address these issues. Thank you!

The list is long, but, here are some highlights:

- 1. Residential Infill Project. We did our best to limit the proposed Housing Opportunity Overlay to smaller area as a 'pilot project' with the hopes that we all could work out the new implementation issues before it impacted the majority of our neighborhood area. We strongly supported retaining existing homes where possible. Over the next couple of months look for new zoning code language to be floated out for public comment. Once that is adopted by the City Council these new standards for infill design will start being developed.
- 2. Early Implementation Package 2045 Comprehensive Plan. RCPNA strongly opposed the rezoning of the 60th Ave. Station Area due to safety issues of inadequate sidewalks along 60th Ave, rallied community efforts to keep the off-street parking requirements for new apartments, and did our best to have the definition of city bikeway to include 'health' in the location determination. The city proposes a project along NE Sandy Blvd. in 2017 that will include the proposal of a bikeway, likely removing parking and travel lanes. We are hoping for 2017 grant funding that will address the sidewalk safety issues along NE 60th between NE Halsey and the Max Station Area at I-84.
- 3. Taco Time becomes a Mixed Use Development- NE Sandy Blvd. & 51st Ave. A six-story mixed use development has been approved for the former Taco Time site together with the large green 4-square house site located on the corner of NE 51st and NE Thompson. The new building will contain 89 residential units, 19 off-street parking spaces, and commercial/retail located on the floor level. The management of on-street parking in this area will be of critical concern as we move forward.
- 4. Portland Clinic comes to RCPNA. This spring the former Rheinlander restaurant site, 5035 NE Sandy Blvd., will make way for

Venerable Properties' new 2-story building that will contain 32,000 square feet of space. Portland Clinic will be leasing 24,000 square feet leaving the remaining store front space available for lease. The design has not been formally submitted as yet, but is said to include at least 45 parking spaces. This will make a welcomed addition to the neighborhood by providing readily accessible health services from family doctors to medical specialists. Please help us welcome them to our community.

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

Trees, Trees, Trees

The Rose City Park Tree Inventory is now finished The inventory report* is full of color photos of trees in our neighborhood, as well as graphs, charts and listings of what and how many of each tree that exists in the collective parking strips (and a few unimproved street areas) of our neighborhood. This report also gives us clues as to what types of trees were popular at different times in the past, and "trending" trees. Some of these trees have been more successful than others in terms of health and appropriateness for the locations

and other limitations of our street trees. Our RCP tree inventory gives us ideas of opportunities to maximize street tree plantings in both size and diversity. We have lots of different types of trees in the neighborhood, but we also have some predominate species that could face problems in a relatively short time span.

The yearly Tree Summit also recently concluded (in November), and we had 10 RCP citizens and friends attend. We now have 14 members of the RCP Tree Coalition. Initial post-inventory meetings will happen in November to start the process of formulating a neighborhood plan to promote a healthy urban forest that also maximizes its street tree space potential- to help our citizens find the right tree for the right space, and to consider appropriate large form trees. Toward that end please note that some of the Friends of Trees selections are free.

One of the more inspiring presentations of the Summit included a personal story of the presenter's family (with young kids) pitching in to help rake the leaves of a large deciduous tree each fall for a senior citizen that was concerned about the upkeep of the tree. Strategies such as this example are just one way that we can engage our neighbors about what the future of our neighborhood will look like in the future. We also heard the tale of another presentation point speaking of making the mistake of selecting a tree simply because of the springtime foliage (a single feature focus). That tree, though beautiful in the spring, later turned out to have several problematic aspects, including a very short life span.

A Friends of Trees presentation will be part of our January 24th General Meeting. Jesse Stemmler will make the presentation and be available for questions and guidance in selecting trees during and after the meeting.

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Northeast Village PDX to Serve Rose City Park

Rose City Park seniors who love their neighborhood and want to age in their own homes will want to check out Northeast Village PDX. This "virtual village" is now offering memberships to seniors in a number of northeast Portland neighborhoods. It's one of several in the greater Portland and Vancouver area.



These grassroots, nonprofit organizations use trained, background-checked volunteers to provide services that can help keep members in their homes as long, happily, and inexpensively as possible. Villages also offer a rich menu of social, wellness and educational activities and lists of vetted and/or recommended professionals – plumbers, electricians, roofers and more – who can be hired for major projects beyond the expertise of volunteers.

How does the village work? Members join at either the full service or associate level. Full service members have access to the full range of programs, volunteer services and vendor recommendations. Associate members also have access to the activities and programs plus the vendor lists, but limited access to volunteer services. At both levels, members may also choose to volunteer. As of November 10th, Northeast Village PDX had 65 members, and it keeps growing.

To receive a service, the member simply makes a call to the Northeast Village PDX office to request such things as transportation to a medical appointment, help with light housekeeping or yard work, walking a dog, or assistance with paperwork or recordkeeping. Using a database, the office volunteer then matches a service volunteer with the member's request, and the service is confirmed.




A Fond Farewell

Long time residents Dr. Thomas J. Wright and Carol M. Halvorson have put their house up for sale and are moving from Rose City Park to Carol's recently deceased mother's house in Southwest.

Many Rose City Park residents will miss Carol's annual dahlia sale. Carol retired from Park Rose school district's alternative school in 2006 but has continued to tutor there and has donated the proceeds of her annual dahlia sale, at least \$600 every year, to the school.



Dr. Wright still does therapy with Portland Family Therapy. For a number of years, he was the President of the International Business Association—businesses in Rose City Park and Roseway. He helped organize several International Day festivals for the association.

Thomas Wright has lived in the house on southeast corner of 58th and Klickitat for 42 years raising two children there. Carol has moved to Rose City Park 23 years ago. The house is one of the first in Rose City Park, and Thomas says he fell in love with it at first sight. There are still the original gas pipes for gas lighting in the house. It has 4 bedrooms, 2 1/2 baths, built in cabinets and book shelves, wood paneling throughout the main floor, wood floors, and large walk- in bedroom closets. Thomas put tongue and groove flooring on the porch as well as on the overhangs.

Carol and Thomas have done two Camino de Santiagos. In 2012, they walked the 500 mile French route starting in St. Jean Pied de Port, France, walking over the Pyrenees and then across Spain to Santiago. It took them 42 days. In 2015, they walked the Camino de Madrid. a 200 miles route which was beautiful also, but Carol said it did not have the same infrastructure that the more used route offers.

Carol and Thomas said, "We will dearly miss our neighbors, the Rose City Park neighborhood, and the beautiful house. The family home we are moving to is more suited for our "growing wiser" years."

Rose City Park neighbors will also miss Carol and Thomas and their contributions to the neighborhood.

Tax Time is Almost Here

Tax time is almost here, but it doesn't have to be taxing or expensive for you. There are a variety of free tax preparation services and free filing—without surprise charges.

In Oregon, we have a winning combination that helps people do their taxes, saves taxpayers money, and brings in cash to the Oregon economy. AARP-Tax-Aide partners with Cash Oregon to provide free tax preparation to Oregonians.

While there is no age limit—this service isn't just for seniors—there are certain types of income sources that the preparers have not been trained to do—for example, rental income, business income if there are employees or loses.

Last year in the State of Oregon, 1,280 volunteer helped taxpayers prepare taxes free of charge. In the Portland Area, over 500 volunteers served 20,255 taxpayers bringing over 22 million in federal tax refunds to working Oregonians and into the local

economy.

There are a number of sites in Northeast Portland: Hollywood Senior Center, Salvation Army Rose Center, Dishman Community Center, Concordia University, Multicultural Center on MLK and Killingsworth, NAYA Family Center on Columbia Blvd and Mt Hood CC Maywood Park campus.

There are also free preparation sites at Our Lady of La Vang and Programa Hispano. Those sites have lower income limits than the Tax-Aide sites but more language capabilities. A full list of all sites, their locations and hours is at cashoregon.org under the free-tax-sites tab.

Finally if you want to prepare taxes yourself, Oregon's Department of Revenue has links to a number of free programs—be sure to use the Oregon links because some of the programs on the IRS site do Federal taxes for free but charge for state taxes.
