GROWING FOR THE BLUFF!

What an exciting year on the Rose City Bluff! Last Spring, volunteer Margaret Kuhn initiated the **Growing for the Bluff Native Plant Seed Project.** In May, she distributed 13 varieties of native plant and grass seeds to nine Rose City Bluff neighbors. The seed varieties included Western Yarrow, Blue Wildrye Grass, Oregon Sunshine, Roemer's Fescue, Prairie Junegrass, River Lupine, and Western Buttercup. By September, these green thumb neighbors had a grand total of **491 starts** for the upcoming Rose City Bluff's Annual Native Planting Day in November!

We welcome volunteers to help us prepare four planting sites at the Oregon White Oak (62nd Street), Rose Hill (64th Street), Meadow and Bench Bluff (both at 65th Street). These sites are already wood chipped; we just need to clear the remaining scattered nonnatives. Our **Prep Work Parties**, are Sundays, October 9th and 23rd at 9:30 a.m.

November 6th is our **2nd Annual Native Planting Day**, the grand finale to our very productive year. Come and catch the spirit of this evolving, rewarding neighborhood project. All Rose City Bluff Restoration events begin at 9:30 a.m. We meet at NE 62nd and Sacramento. Contact <u>RoseCityBluff@gmail.com</u> to RSVP for these events and we will share more details including what tools to bring.

The LU&T Committee meets on the 3rd Thursday of every month from 7-9 p.m. To join the Zoom meeting, see details on <u>rcpna.org</u>. The next meetings will be October 20 and November 17. They are open to the public.

Hollywood HUB Housing at the 42nd Street MAX Station

At the July LU&TC meeting, Tri-Met and Bridge Housing presented the latest design for the Hollywood HUB Housing. The original project, presented in July 2021, was for 201 units in a 13-story building. The revised plans include 12 stories with 234 units, 40 parking spaces, and a central courtyard. Bus routes for the 66 and 75 lines will share a pullout in front of the building. They are in the advanced concept phase and will return when more design work is completed.

Slow Streets

At 64th and Brazee, Ben Joy and Sharron Fuchs distributed flyers showing the most recent design for that intersection. PBOT proposed to replace the existing candlesticks with 13 round concrete planters. Neighbors were encouraged to vote on whether to accept this design. There was low response resulting in a tie (six in favor and six against). The Committee encouraged PBOT to come up with an alternate design that had fewer planters (7-9). Also, at 64th and Sacramento, PBOT began installing two bollards with signs atop. The Committee asked PBOT to place the signs at the curbside, but the design had progressed too far and could not be changed.

Completing Sidewalk Infrastructure

Neighbor Raymond Saul had crafted a letter to Adena Long, Portland Parks Director, and the Portland City Commissioners to address the unimproved streets along Rose City and Normandale parks. Some Committee members stressed that neighbors affected by adding sidewalks be notified of our informational communications and potentially invited to a future meeting.

Traffic Changes at Sandy/Alameda/57th

Scott Coehn from PBOT attended the May LU&TC meeting to share the latest plan to change Alameda at 57th & Sandy to a one-way, westbound street. The topic was further discussed at our June and July meetings. Although Committee members and neighbors were not pleased with the plan, Scott Coehn said it should be completed this summer and any feedback from the Committee would not affect the installation.

THE PORTLAND HORSE PROJECT LIVES ON

Walking around the neighborhood, I see a beautiful painted horse, and then another, and another. Every horse I pass is unique, beautiful, and makes me smile. I wonder who is painting these fun works of art? It's our resident artist and neighbor, or should I say "neigh-bor", Derek O'Bannon. It's been around since the mid-2000s. There's a lot of history and photos online and Derek is adding his own colorful spin to a long-running art exhibit.

I met with Derek to learn more about his art and his painted horses. What a talented and amazing artist he is. Here's what he shared.

What inspired you to bring the Portland Horse Project to our neighborhood?

"It was one free horse that I found someone was giving away. I thought it would look neat outside and look really neat painted. People were really responsive to it, especially the kids in the neighborhood. I started finding more and giving them away. The horses are usually plastic, all sizes, but mostly around 2 feet tall with manes and tails."

How many have you painted and shared with your neighbors?

"I've been painting the horses since 2019, so probably close to 100. A lot are little horses. I make boxes and put them out for anyone to take. I like to know where the big horses are going. I don't want them to be stuck inside, or in a backyard. As art, I want them out for everyone to enjoy. I love public art! It's always been one of my favorite things."

Where do you find your horses?

"I find them at Goodwill. Some are donated by people around the neighborhood."

What is your favorite thing about doing this?

"It's the joy it gives people in having a horse. A lot of people say they don't have kids, or a historical horse ring in their curb, but that's OK. I say, put them out and kids will come, horses are for everyone, and everyone enjoys them. I love painting and sharing them."



I agree! I just got a horse of my own and couldn't be more excited and prouder to display him. Derek installed this painted beauty in my front yard (see photo). The horses can be found all around the NE Sacramento blocks. See how many you can find!

WALKER AWARD

In honor of longtime RCPNA Chair George M. Walker and his wife Esther Walker, Rose City Park Neighborhood Association honors members of our community that demonstrate outstanding participation, involvement, and advocacy in and for activities impacting the neighborhood.

The WALKER Award is being given to Kieu-Oanh Nguyen. She has a long history of service to her community. For years, she tirelessly supported immigrants as they transitioned to Portland and needed assistance navigating processes such as citizenship, school, health care, etc. Kieu-Oanh served on the RCPNA Board for nearly a decade and was a leader in disaster preparedness, trained in emergency response, and on the Neighborhood Emergency Team. More recently, she supported her vulnerable neighbors during the pandemic, helping them navigate the vaccination process, especially in the early months of distribution. Thank you, Kieu-Oanh, for your energy, effort, and service in support of others.

OUR HISTORY ON DISPLAY



Knowing a community's history connects us to our land and to each other. Here in our vicinity, Rocky Butte was a volcano 285,000 years ago. Though volcanoes shaped the land, it was the Missoula Flood that carved the Alameda Ridge and provided the flat land for the Rose City Golf Course. thousand years ago the first Native Americans began calling this land their home. In the early 1900's, Portland Country Club and Livestock Association built a racetrack and a grandstand for 8,000 people to attend horse, motorcycle, and car races. In 1909, the third national airshow ever highlighted a biplane racing a 1909 Buick down the racetrack.

All of this history is on display at the Rose City Golf Clubhouse. The clubhouse itself was built in 1932 and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The

Register is the official federal list of properties that are significant in American history, architecture, archaeology, and engineering. Inside the clubhouse is the Rose City Grill, which is open to the public for breakfast, lunch, and snacks. Plan a visit and learn more about the 285,000 years of this land we now call home. The Clubhouse is open every day, 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
