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
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#### **CHAIR'S CORNER**

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


The Rose City Park Neighborhood Association (RCPNA) is part of Portland's network of neighborhood associations, which represent their neighborhoods' interests in a wide variety of ways, including interfacing with public agencies and governing bodies. RCPNA's mission is to work to maintain and improve the livability of the neighborhood.

Membership in RCPNA is open to all persons of voting age who reside, own property or operate a business, government agency or non-profit organization within the boundaries of the neighborhood area (NE Fremont St. to I-84 and NE 47th to NE 65th Avenues). There are no dues or other requirements preventing a neighbor from being a member.

RCPNA is governed by a board of directors, unpaid volunteers who are elected annually at a general membership meeting, and it operates under the aegis of Southeast Uplift, one of several area coalition offices that provide support to Portland's 95 neighborhood associations. 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## Planning for Normandale Park shooting memorial moves forward



On April 2, Rose City Park Neighborhood Association members hosted space at Albina Head Start/Owen Blank Center near Frazer Park for Normandale Park mass shooting survivors, family members, supporters, and community members to share thoughts on creating a permanent memorial. The event was facilitated by Nanci Champlin, executive director of SE Uplift (SEUL) and Stephanie Howard, director of community safety for Portland. Members of the Bureau of Parks and Recreation and City Repair also attended.

Special thanks to the team from City Repair, who helped facilitate and develop a plan to move forward together regarding both a street mural and a permanent memorial. We discussed several themes and shared goals for this work and agreed to meet every other week, beginning April 15 with the goal of getting a street mural permit approved by June 30, 2025. Meetings will focus on determining what elements an artist should incorporate into the street painting, selecting an artist, and reviewing proposed artwork.

All are welcome to attend these bi-monthly meetings. While we are focusing on having the street mural done this summer, we will also continue to keep in mind elements that will help to inform possibilities for a permanent, physical memorial.

Local journalists and Rose City Park residents Todd Milbourn and Lisa Heyamoto purchased the 40-yearold newspaper in April from longtime owner Mary DeHart, who's now retired.

Becoming publishers is a dream come true for the couple, who have devoted their lives to journalism, teaching and building community. They started their careers in local news, met as reporters for The Sacramento Bee and taught journalism and

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storytelling for more than a decade at the University of Oregon.

"The Star News is a true gem of a newspaper," Todd said. "This is an incredible opportunity to serve our neighbors and this wonderful community while drawing on our decades of professional experience."

Todd's day-job is training journalists for an international business news company. He's also an RCPNA board member. Lisa works for a nonprofit that supports local news organizations, and volunteers at their daughters' schools.

Both can be found at Normandale Park twice a day with their very energetic puppy, Mochi!

Todd and Lisa plan to keep the Star's focus on neighbors, local businesses and community happenings. Todd and Lisa are especially excited to engage with community members, business owners and non-profit leaders, and wholeheartedly welcome feedback about what you'd like to see in the paper's next chapter.



## **Land Use and Transportation Projects**

The LU&T Committee meets the 3<sup>rd</sup> Thursday of every month from 7-9 pm at the German American Society at 5626 NE Alameda. Information on the meetings and proposed agendas will be posted ahead of time on NextDoor and on our website at RCPNA.org. These are open public meetings, and all are invited to attend.

#### Anamic Construction - Development on 62nd & Sandy/Stanton

Anamic Construction/Development is starting construction on four lots in RCP (2833 NE 62<sup>nd</sup> Ave, 2890 NE 62<sup>nd</sup> Ave., 6140 NE Stanton and 6201 NE Stanton). A total of 20 units are planned with no off-street parking. We forwarded comments from our committee and neighbors (generally criticizing the lack of garages) to the developer and received the following response: "A floor plan with garages won't fit on any of the Stanton properties because it's a 5,400 SF lot. So there's not enough room to put a garage. We have spent a good amount of time with our architect in early renditions trying to fit a garage and make the living area big enough to make the house functional, but we were not able to come to a suitable design. So we went ahead with a design that did not include garages."

#### NE 60<sup>th</sup> and Halsey Street Area Improvement Project

The Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) has hired Kodiak Pacific Construction Co. to begin work on the NE 60th Avenue and Halsey Street Area Improvements Project in the Rose City Park and North Tabor neighborhoods. Construction is scheduled to begin this spring and continue through spring 2026. Utility companies are now working in the project area moving elements like pipes, wires, and poles in preparation for project construction.

The construction contractor planned to have schedule and detour information available the last week of April. Please check the project website and via the GovDelivery email subscription tool. #### sey Street Area Improvement Project

The project will repave and reconfigure sections of street, replace outdated traffic signals, add turn lanes, improve sidewalks, and build and enhance pedestrian and bike crossings. PBOT's aim is to improve traffic flow and make the street safer for pedestrians as well as people riding transit, biking, and driving.

PBOT knows residents have been waiting patiently for construction of this project. Both the Covid-19 Continued on page 6

pandemic and the complexity of designing around existing underground water and sewer systems caused this delay. The project team changed plans multiple times to find ways to reduce costs.

PBOT will also be constructing safety improvements along NE Halsey Street between 68th and 92nd avenues. This is a separate project focused on safety and access to transit and slated to begin construction later in the summer. 
