The Rose City Park Neighborhood Association (RCPNA) is part of Portland’s network of neighborhood associations, which represent their neighborhoods’ interests in a wide variety of ways, including interfacing with public agencies and governing bodies. RCPNA’s mission is to work to maintain and improve the livability of the neighborhood.

Membership in RCPNA is open to all persons of voting age who reside, own property or operate a business, government agency or non-profit organization within the boundaries of the neighborhood area (NE Fremont St. to I-84 and NE 47th to NE 65th Avenues). There are no dues or other requirements preventing a neighbor from being a member.

RCPNA is governed by a board of directors, unpaid volunteers who are elected annually at a general membership meeting, and it operates under the aegis of Southeast Uplift, one of several area coalition offices that provide support to Portland’s 95 neighborhood associations. 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Portland Food Project: Make An Impact on Hunger - We Make it Simple

Do you shop for groceries? Are you wanting to take action at the local level to ease hunger in our Portland community? At the February General Meeting, the RCPNA Board has invited the Portland Food Project, a 100 percent volunteer-run non-profit organization, to share their simple and efficient model for getting food to hungry folks.

The Portland Food Project (PFP) is a network of over 120 coordinators who each have a route of neighbors and friends comprising their team of donors. Each donor fills a green cloth reusable bag with healthy, non-perishable food six times a year.

Neighborhood coordinators collect full bags from front doorsteps once every other month, and deliver them for distribution to 16 local partner food pantries. Donor teams can also be friends or coworkers at a business or other organization, and not necessarily neighbors who live close to one another. Others have stepped up by giving cash donations that the PFP turns into gift cards for the pantries to purchase specific food needs. Monetary donations are a practical option for donors for whom shopping is difficult.

The last months of 2025 brought a surge of new coordinators and food donors as people responded to the greatly increased need for food due to economic issues and cuts to the SNAP program. At the end of 2025 the PFP had distributed the equivalent of nearly 12,000 bags of non-perishable foods to pantries.

In an effort to facilitate ways to make a meaningful impact in our neighborhood, we invited Portland Food Project to present at our February General Meeting.

If you would like to become a member or learn more about the PFP, join us on February 24th or go to www.portlandfoodproject.org. When you sign up as a regular food donor, the PFP assigns you to a coordinator in your area. If you can make a larger commitment, consider becoming a neighborhood coordinator and recruiting friends, neighbors, or coworkers for your own route. Townhouses at NE 50th and Thompson

From the Developer/Builder:

You've likely noticed that construction is nearing completion on the new townhomes at NE 50th and Thompson. The developer describes these six units as modern, flexible homes with large windows and a mix of layouts, including 2-bed/2-bath and 3-bed/2-bath options featuring a ground-level space that can serve as an office, gym, or guest studio. Four units will include full car garages, while the remaining two will have dedicated bicycle garages. Completion is expected in March 2026. Stairs at NE Wistaria Dr. and NE 51st Ave.

The Committee wrote a letter to Director Williams at Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) regarding the disrepair of the stairs at NE Wistaria Dr, and NE 51st Ave. The stairs had been blocked off and were unusable. We don't know if it was a result of our letter, but, thankfully, the stairs have been repaired and reopened.

Speeding on NE Sandy (from NE 52nd to NE 57th)

The Committee wrote a letter to Chief Bob Day of the Portland Police Bureau regarding speeding on NE Sandy from NE 52nd to NE 57th. We received a detailed response from Sgt. Christopher Petrov (Traffic Officer) who outlined some of the steps PPB could take to monitor the speeding issue including deployment of the Motor Officers to NE Sandy Blvd., replacement of photo enforcement cameras at existing locations, installation of new photo enforcement cameras at new locations and deployment of new photo radar vans on Sandy. Sgt. Petrov will attend our February General Meeting to discuss this and other traffic issues further with neighbors.

The Board initiated an effort to place a plaque or other marker as an element of the Golf Course Trail project. 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NE 60th and Halsey Street Area Improvement Project – Schedule Update

The project (now under construction) will repave and reconfigure sections of the street, replace outdated traffic signals, add turn lanes, improve sidewalks, and build and enhance pedestrian and bike crossings. Note: Portions of Halsey will have one lane in each direction and a center turn lane.

Northbound NE 60th Avenue was scheduled to reopen in late January 2026, at the time this newsletter went to press:

- NE 60th Avenue & Halsey Street Intersection – Complete January 2026
- NE 47th Avenue and Halsey Street Intersection – Complete Spring 2026
- NE 57th Avenue and Halsey Street Intersection - Complete Spring 2026
- NE 55th Avenue and Halsey Street Crossing – Complete Spring 2026
- NE 50th Avenue and Halsey Street Crossing - Complete Spring 2026
